

SPEECH CONTEST RULES

General Rules for All Toastmasters Speech Contests

Unless otherwise stated, these rules apply to all speech contests conducted by Toastmasters International clubs, areas, divisions, and districts, as well as all contests conducted at the International Convention.

1. Speech Contest Policy

- A. Toastmasters International recognizes and supports the following official speech contests: International, Evaluation, Humorous, Table Topics, Tall Tales, and Video (only for members of undistricted clubs). No other contest types, showcases, etc., shall be conducted by districts.
 - Districts must conduct the International Speech Contest. The International Speech Contest shall only be conducted in English.
 - 2. Districts may conduct up to three additional English speech contests each year.
 - 3. Districts may also conduct up to four non-English speech contests each year.
 - a) Each of these contests is conducted in a language selected by the district director and approved by the district executive committee.
 - b) A non-English contest may be conducted using the rules of the International Speech Contest. Such a contest shall be titled using the name of the language. For example: Chinese Speech Contest.
 - c) Non-English contests shall not continue beyond the district level.
- B. Contests must originate at the club level and proceed through the area, division, and district levels, respectively; only contests following this progression are permitted at each level. All clubs are eligible to advance contestants to the area level in all contests regardless of the contest language or the primary language of the club.
- C. Toastmasters International pays the travel expenses of each contestant who participates in the International Speech Contest at the semifinal level at the International Convention. The travel allowance is computed in the same manner and subject to the same restrictions as that of district leaders.
- D. The Speech Contest Rulebook is protocol and applies to all official Toastmasters speech contests. Modifications to rules may only be made through the administrative protocol review process. Exceptions shall not be permitted.
- E. Individual admission fees to a contest may be charged to audience attendees and contest officials; however, contestants may never be charged a fee to compete in a contest, and clubs may never be charged a fee to send a contestant to a contest.

2. Eligibility

- A. To be eligible to compete in any official Toastmasters speech contest, a member must:
 - Be a paid member of the club, area, division, and district in which he or she is competing.



District 57 Table Topics and International Speech Contest Script

The following is a suggested script for the Area-level Table Topics and International Speech contests. For Division contests, change Area references to Division. Clubs may also use this as a template.

The script's purpose is to ensure that contest rules such as speaker introductions and timing are adhered to. As long as you cover items outlined in the current Speech Contest Rulebook, you can modify the script – but do consider time carefully if you add any additional content.

	 Use current protocol list. If not available, announce in following order: Current International Directors, Current District Officers from other Districts, Current District Top 4 & Immediate Past District Governor, Host Division Director, Other Current Division Directors, Current Administration Manager/Finance Manager/ Logistics Manager/Parliamentarian, Current Area Directors, Past International Directors, Past District 57 Governors, Past District Governors of other Districts (no other past dignitaries)
	Speech contests are an important part of the Toastmasters educational program. They provide an opportunity for Toastmasters to gain speaking experience, as well as an opportunity for other Toastmasters to learn by observing proficient speakers.
	Today's Table Topics and International Speech Contest winners will progress to the Division contests, which will take place on April Those winners will continue on to represent Division at the District 57 contests, which will take place during the Spring Conference on May 6, 2017. If an area or division contest winner is unable to participate in the next contest level, the highest placed available contestant will advance.

Welcome, Contest Procedures

Thank you

Welcome everyone. I will begin with an overview of the Table Topics contest procedures, for the benefit of our guests and newer members.

Table Topics are short impromptu speeches, in response to a question or topic, which test the ability to speak on a given subject without advanced notice.

All contestants receive the same topic, and the judges choose the winning Table Topics speech.

When the contest begins, the Sergeant-at-Arms escorts all contestants except the first from the room. Once the other contestants are in a designated area where they cannot hear the proceedings. To avoid any perception of bias, I announce each contestant's name, the table topic, repeat the table topic, and repeat the contestant's name. After I say the contestant's name the second time, your job is to give energetic applause to encourage each speaker. The contestant will speak on the given topic for one to two minutes.

After each contestant has finished, the Sergeant-at-Arms retrieves the next contestant. After delivering their speech, contestants can stay in the room. No one else is allowed in or out of the room during the Table Topics speeches.

The speeches last 1-2 minutes. A green signal is given at 1:00, yellow at 1:30, and red at 2:00. Speeches less than 1:00 or longer than 2:30 are disqualified.

There is one minute of silence after each contestant for the judges to mark their ballots. After the final contestant, I ask for silence until the judges are finished ranking the contestants and the counters have collected all the ballots.

The contestants have agreed upon the following speaking area:

The speaking order has been chosen randomly by drawing lots. I will announce the order now. You might want to mark your program with the contestant numbers.

•	Read speaking order and say each contestant's name the same way.	Be sure to
	pause after each to provide audience time to mark program.	

The contestants and judges have been briefed on the rules prior to the contest.
