It's been several months since we rolled out the two Outstanding Achievement award programs for this year; how did the year go by so quickly?

Well, it's time to start checking to see just how awesome you've been as Toastmasters this year. We're talking going above and beyond just giving a few speeches; we're talking about a -lot- of speeches and a club doing more than just meeting expectations.



Individual Achievement Outstanding Toastmasters Award (OTMA)

Less complicated than previous years, the OTMA this year uses the principle of 'You can do a lot of things, but you don't need to do all of the things and still achieve greatness.' Previous years of OTMA required racking up an impressive points score in all the categories; this should be a little easier because it doesn't require as much completeness.

- Complete 3 out of 4 things in a category to complete a category.
- Complete 4 out of 5 categories (Speak, Lead, Instruct, Collaborate, Explore) to achieve your OTMA.
- Submit it by May 31st, with the intention to get awards ordered and delivered in time for the end-of-year party in late July.

While we can all agree that clubs that complete 8 DCP points are definitely Outstanding, we would also like to recognize that there's more than just the DCP points worth merit.

Independent of the Distinguished Club system, the OCA is designed to recognize clubs who do Toastmasters fellowship things - we've been hearing a lot of clubs have been hosting and staffing the various Area contests. So the eight required points for the OCA award can come from more than just giving speeches and recruiting members. It's about giving back to the Toastmasters community by running Events - Speechcrafts and YLP programs count as well.

The reward for your OCA is a custom designed ribbon for your club banner - something no other club in the world outside of District 57 can earn. And as a bonus - this award can go to any club with 8 points - so if you missed your Distinguished Club award because you didn't have enough members, you aren't coming away empty handed.

Complete your OCA points by May 31st, 2026.

Cash In On District Bucks

By the way, did you know that if your club has been doing Toastmaster things, you've been earning District Bucks? This year, I've streamlined the system for awarding incentive money in the Incentive Tracker system - and most of you haven't taken advantage of the money in the system waiting for you.

As of 2/19, we've awarded nearly nine thousand dollars to clubs, but only a thousand (and sixty-one cents) has been claimed. Don't leave your club's award money on the table!

Note: In order to claim your District Bucks, you must:

- Have someone in your club have a Concur account. If you don't, please mail jeffrey@d57tm.org so I can get you set up with an account.
- Purchase items only from the Toastmasters store or items (supplies, refreshments for Open Houses, other items that benefit the club, not including paying for memberships)
- Save your receipts and file in Concur before May 15th, 2026, or 30 days after purchase, whichever comes first. Your club will have the purchases reimbursed up to the limit of your District Bucks in the system.

WHAT CONTEST ROLES CAN I FILL AT AN AREA CONTEST?



A surprising number of Toastmasters are required to put on a speech contest. We are holding both Table Topics and International Speech Contests this year at every Area Contest. Contest functionaries often serve both contests, even when Areas combine their events.

These minimum roles must be filled to hold an Area Speech Contest:

- (1) Contest Chair
- (1) Chief Judge
- (1) Contest Toastmaster (+ 1 back-up suggested)
- (2) Sergeant-at-Arms
- (2) Contest Timekeepers
- (2) Ballout Counters
- (5) Voting Judges (+ 2 back-ups suggested)
- (1) Tiebreaker Judge

Contestants, Chief Judges, Voting Judges, and Tiebreaker Judges all have eligibility requirements to participate. You will find the requirements for Contestants on pages 6 & 7, and for Judges on pages 7 & 8 in the [2025-26 SPEECH CONTEST RULEBOOK \(1171\)](#). Please reach out to D57 Contest Chair Kate Mills at katemillstoast@gmail.com or 510-552-3656 if you aren't sure whether you or your contest volunteer qualifies for the assigned role. We'll figure it out together!

Savvy Contest Chairs assign additional unofficial roles to give their events a power boost of fun:

- **Greeter** - What's not to like about earning a warm, event memory? Send guest book entries to your Area Clubs for follow-up--might be a future new member.
- **Hospitality Coordinator** - Yum. Snacks power up functionaries skipping meals to help you, and say Aloha to guests.
- **Photographer** - Let's get those clubs on their social media! Also, D57 is looking for pictures to commemorate its last contest season.

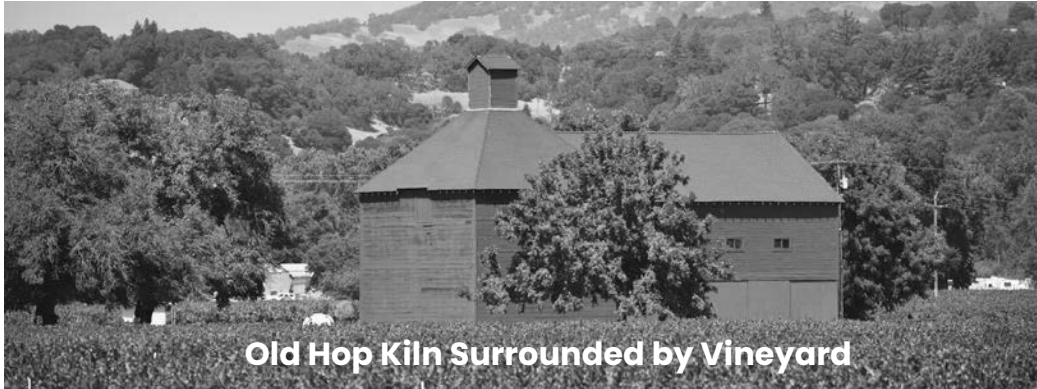

D57's most Northern Division

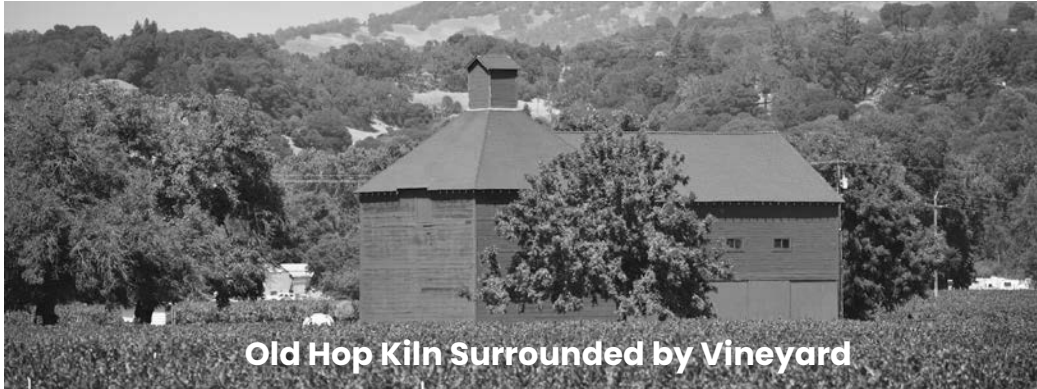

How can a big club have problems?

Tony, the Southern Marin VPE, describes:

We have what you might call "good" problems. As of 02.17.2026, we have 45 active members. We frequently have guests who quickly become members because they love the welcoming and supportive nature of our membership. At first glance, that seems like a great thing, however our high member count sometimes makes it difficult to reserve a slot for a speaking role because of the high level of competition. We have a rather long meeting (1 hour and 45 minutes) so we are experimenting with adding more speaker roles. We currently have 2 speaker slots and may go to 3 to accommodate more members per meeting.

Can there be successful small clubs in a rural area?

Yes. We have the Tenacious Talkers that is in Lakeport. Lakeport is in Lake County. Lake County contains one of the best Bass fishing lakes in the USA. However its population is only 68,000 people. How do they survive? Currently their meetings are strictly online. But also, as we see with so many clubs, they have one person that is the driving force for the club. That person for the Tenacious Talkers is Greg Scott DTM, PID. He is also the District 205 District Leadership Committee (DLC) Chair. He calls Toastmasters "My Mental Vitamin." Greg is a testament of what Toastmasters can do for one's life and a great cheerleader for Toastmasters.

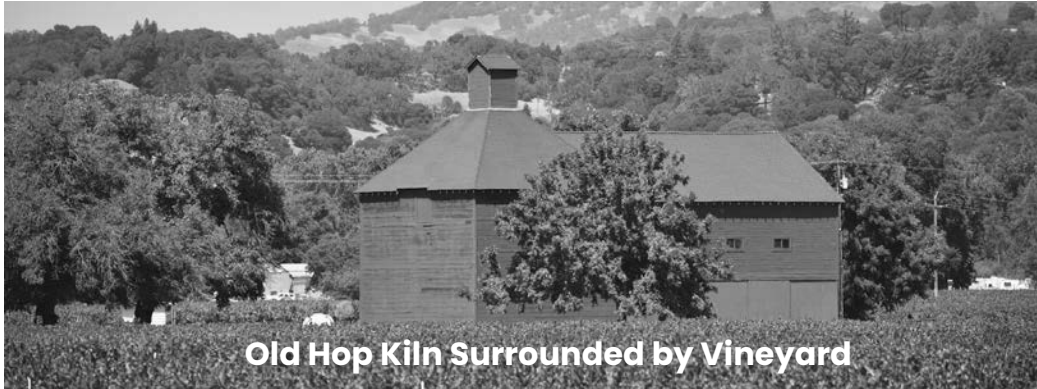

At first, it was just a dream. An inkling of an idea. Starting a whole club felt like a daunting task. Would anyone show up? Would it die off due to a lack of interest?

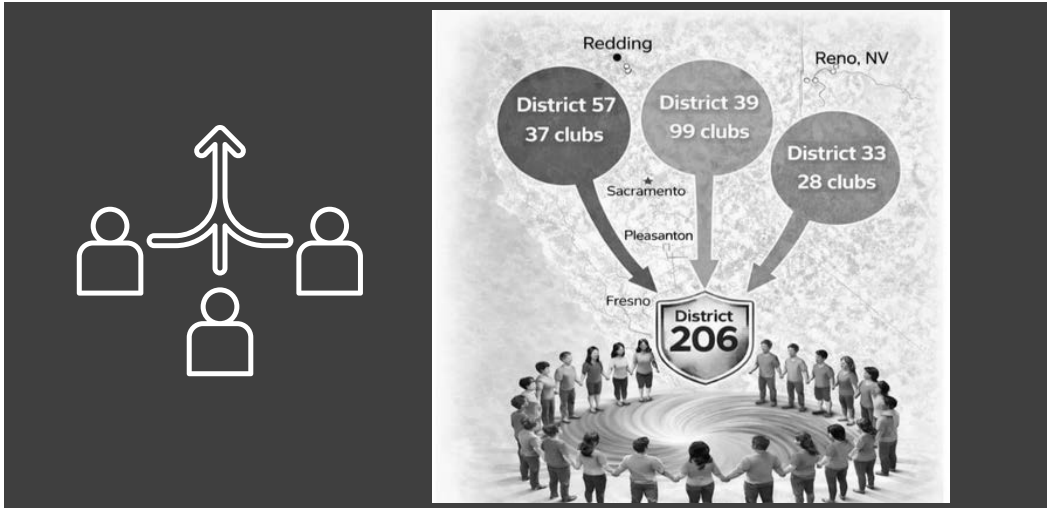

District 206: Honoring Where We've Been, Stepping Into What's Next

There are seasons in our Toastmasters journey when things feel steady and familiar... and seasons when something new begins to take shape. This is one of those moments.

Beginning July 1, 2026, the clubs and members of District 57 will be integrated into two new Districts. Thirty-seven clubs from Divisions B, E, and Area C8 will become part of a newly formed district—District 206. (See list of clubs moving to District 206 here) This new district brings together 164 clubs from three current districts: two divisions and one area from District 57, all five divisions from District 39, and one division from District 33.

This realignment was initiated by the Toastmasters International Board of Directors to ensure each district has the ideal number of clubs to effectively support members, develop leaders, and sustain long-term health.

This change is about service.
It is about creating a structure that can best support clubs—
not just today, but for years to come.

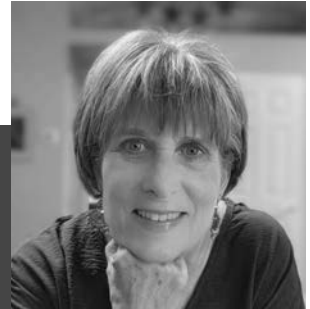
District 206: Honoring Where We've Been, Stepping Into What's Next

What This Means for Your Club



Let me begin with what matters most: your club will continue to operate just as it does now. Your meeting time. Your members. Your culture. Your rhythm.

What will change is the structure around you. As three districts blend into one, clubs will be placed into new Areas and Divisions alongside clubs that may not have been part of their previous district. This is a natural and necessary part of forming a new district from existing ones. Think of it as expanding the circle.

New connections will form. New leaders will emerge. New opportunities for collaboration and growth will unfold, while what makes your club your club remains untouched.

The Work Behind the Scenes

Alignment is not new to Toastmasters. Each year, every district proposes and approves a realignment of Divisions and Areas to better support the clubs and members. Our work on the District 206 Alignment Committee is the same, but with a bit more complexity, as it brings together clubs from three different districts. As with an annual realignment, we are tasked with thoughtfully designing a structure for a new District. Our mission is clear: to create a Division and Area structure that best serves all 164 clubs while fully complying with Toastmasters International policies.

We are carefully considering geographic proximity, balanced Areas and Divisions, club strength and growth potential, and the ability for Area Directors to effectively support their clubs.

This process takes time because it matters. A preliminary alignment will be submitted in March, with final adjustments occurring after April renewals, so the structure reflects current club strength and membership. Every D57 club that will be in District 206 belongs in this process and matters.

The Human Side of Change

Your presence matters. Your vote matters. Your voice matters.

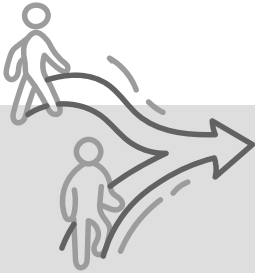

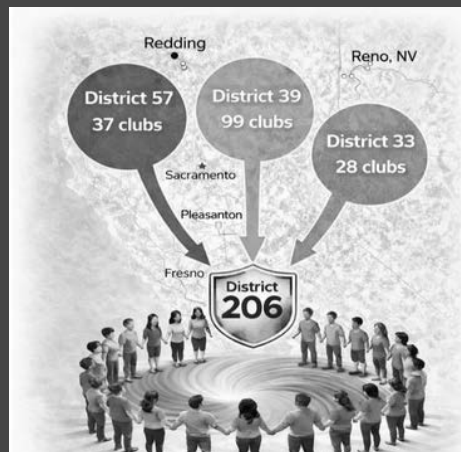
As your Alignment Committee, our commitment is simple. We are approaching this work with care, transparency, and deep respect for the clubs and members we serve.

Who Is an Area Director?

An Area Director is a Toastmaster who chooses to serve beyond their home club. They are a volunteer district leader who supports 4 to 6 clubs within a specific geographic area.

They are usually experienced members who:

An Area Director is not a judge or inspector. They are a coach, connector, and supporter.

- Shares district updates, training opportunities, and events
- Helps struggling clubs find practical solutions
- Recognizes and celebrates club achievements

They serve as the bridge between the clubs and the District.
